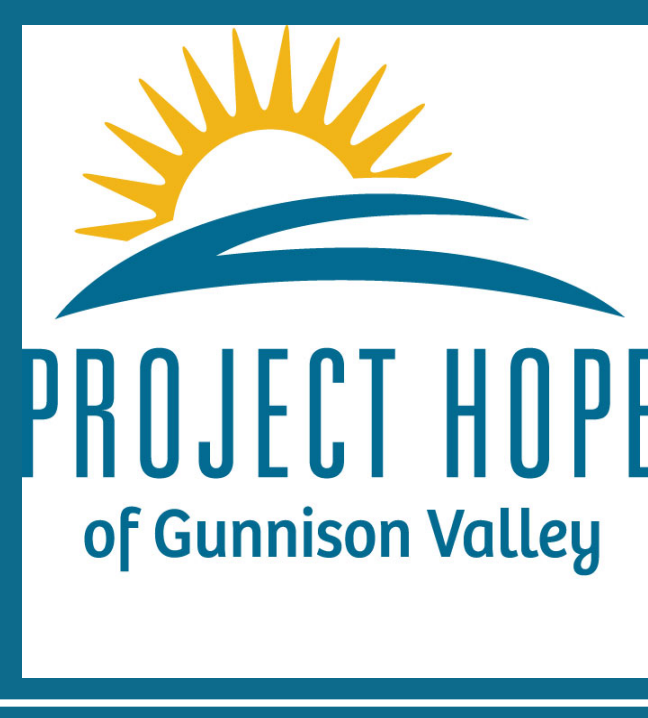

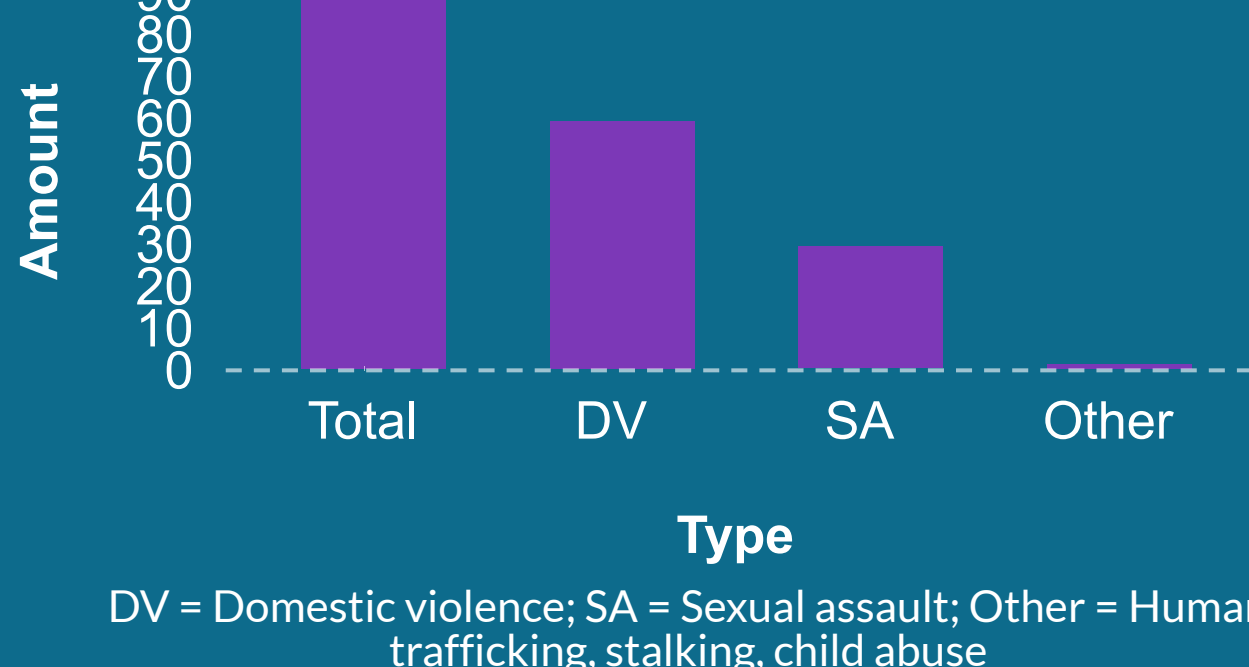

DV = Domestic violence; SA = Sexual assault; Other = Human trafficking, stalking, child abuse

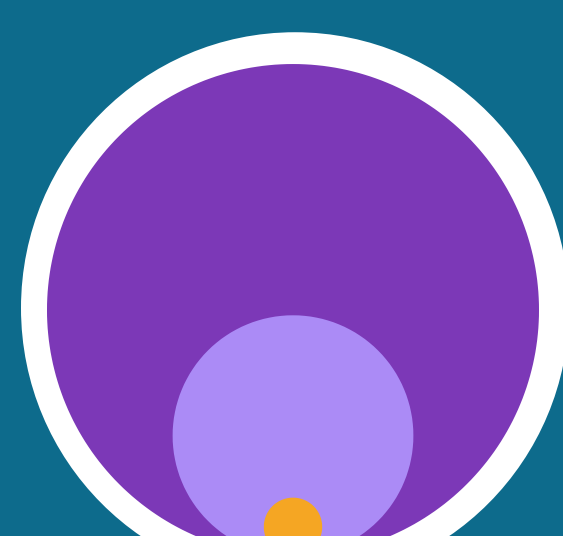

### Gender



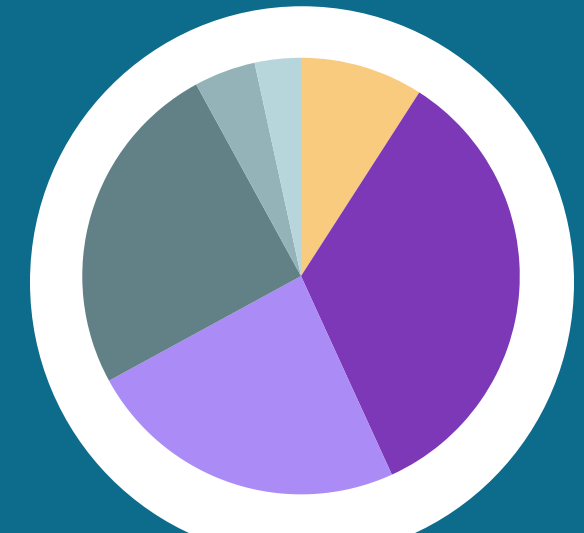

### Language



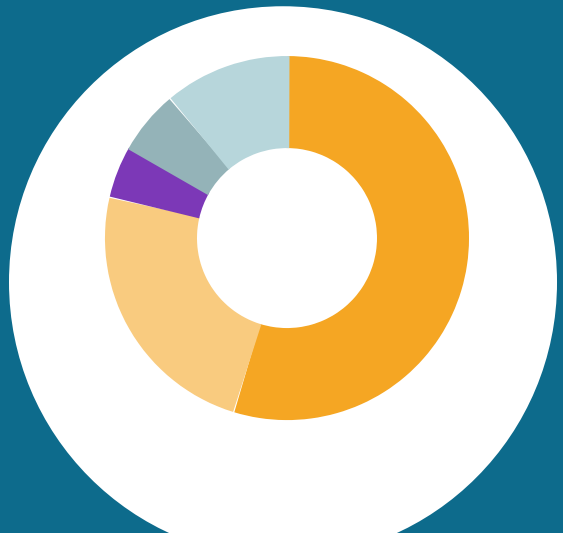

## Adaline's Story\*\*

Adaline came to us after just escaping her home, where she experienced extreme domestic violence and drug abuse. When she arrived at our door, she had just discovered she was pregnant, and had absolutely nothing for herself or for her baby: no home, no job, and no hope.

Adaline's immediate needs were housing and food. Safety was a top priority. We were able to offer her temporary housing at one of our safe shelters because of your donations. To help her with her lack of food, we gave her a food box, donated by the food pantry.

Adaline came in regularly with many needs, but above all she asked for help with her emotional trauma. Adaline suffers from deep depression, anxiety, and PTSD from her abuse. Adaline refused counseling services and said that she the only place felt comfortable in the community was at Project Hope.

Project Hope helped Adaline find affordable long-term housing, childcare for her new baby, and a full-time job. Also, Adaline was without transportation for a long time and now has been able to purchase a car.

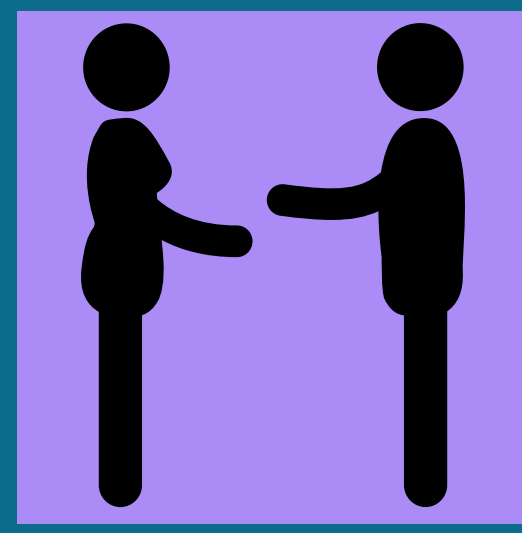
In turn, Project Hope recognizes that we could not have helped Adaline and others like her without assistance from our community and donors. Thank you for all that you do.

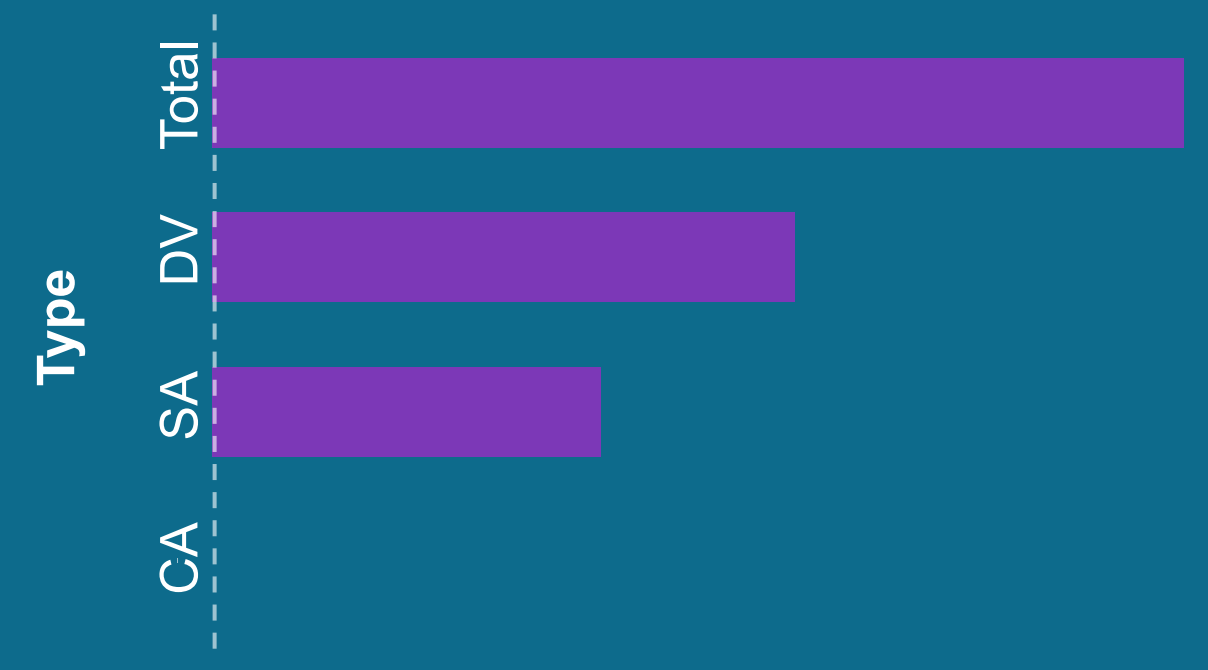

## Secondary Victims

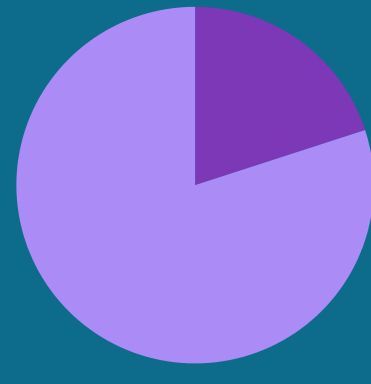

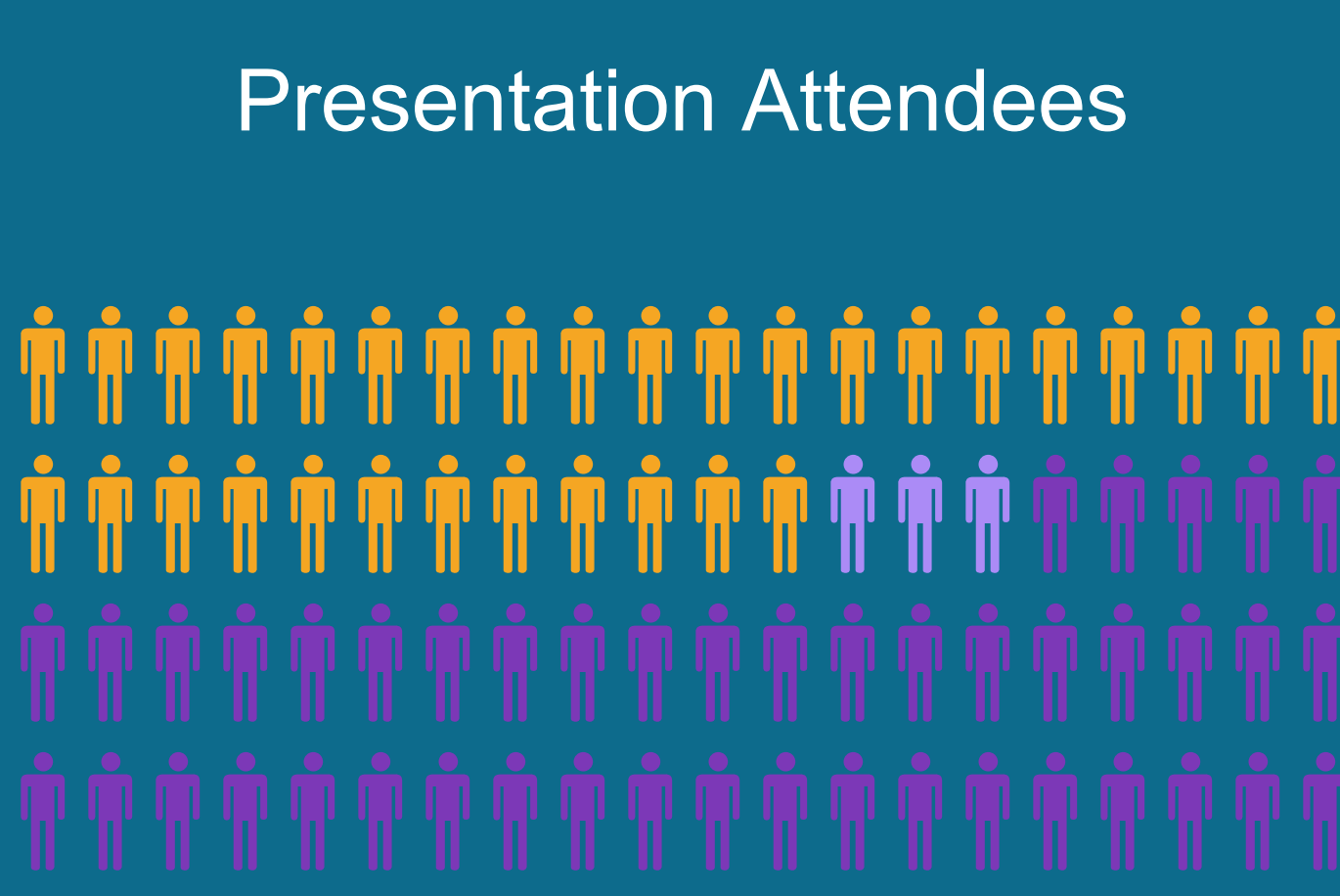

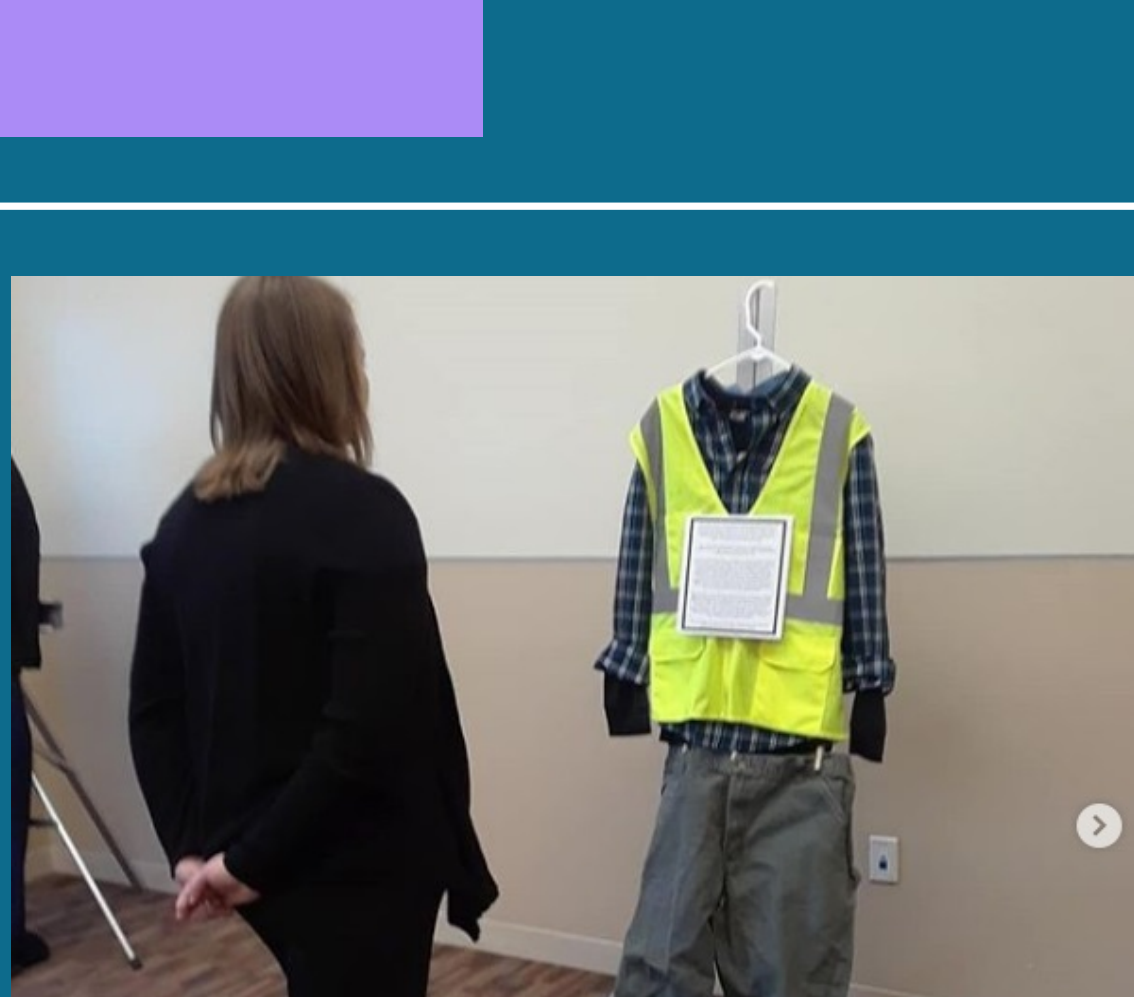

## What Were You Wearing?

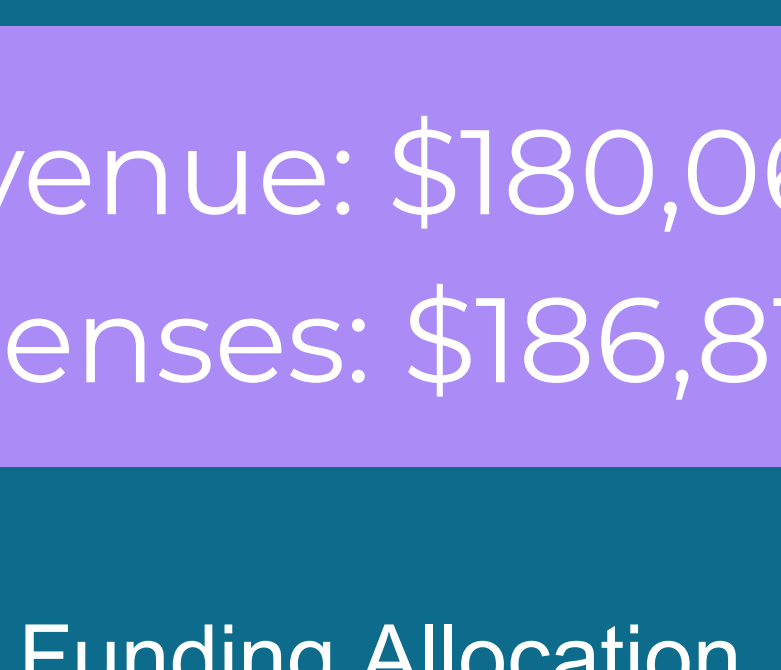
Project Hope partnered with Western Colorado University and it's students to organize an art installation in honor of Sexual Assault Awareness Month in April.

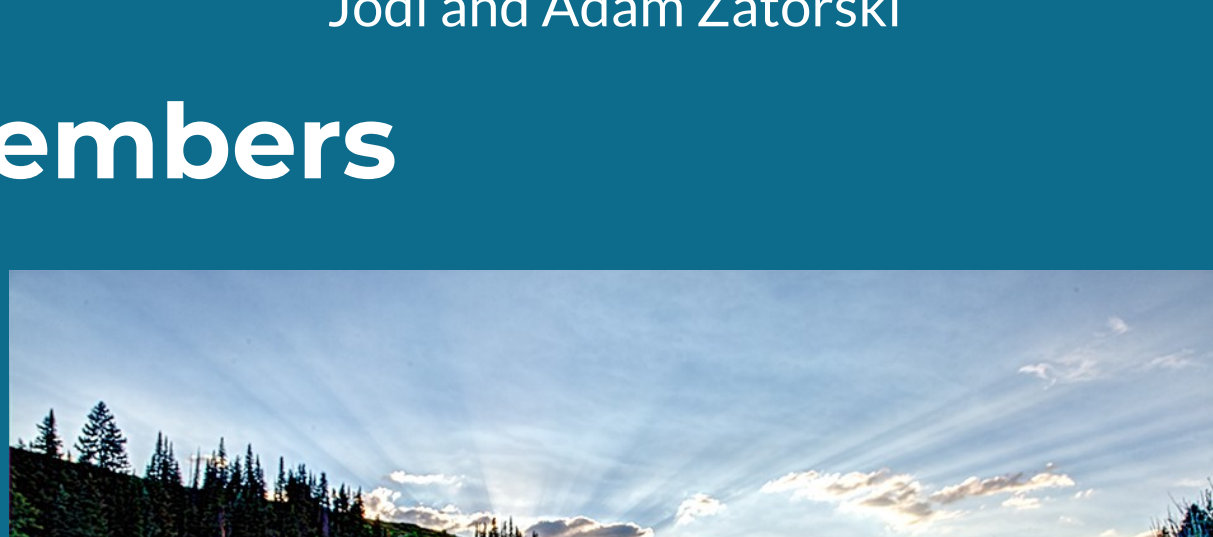
